

The UWC Logo Contest concluded with a design reflecting the intent and purpose of the UWC. It is similar in shape and

color to the ANS logo, with two transmission towers separating "Utility Working Conference" from the "American Nuclear Society." Green was chosen as the color of "Utility Working Conference" to signify that nuclear power is truly a "green" source of electric power. Two silhouettes face each other in the center of the



medallion, sharing a common thought. The electron orbits indicate that the thought involves something nuclear. The "i" is the common thought and represents that one "golden" idea that we want each attendee to take back and put into action.

Committee on New Construction By Ted Quinn and Kyle Turner

Since 1990, the OPD Committee on New Construction (CNC) has focused on the major challenges and opportunities for construction of new nuclear plants in the U.S. Co-chaired by **Ted Quinn** (tedquinn@cox.net) and **Kyle Turner** (kyleturn@att.net), CNC members represent utilities, regulators, NSSS suppliers, A/Es, vendors, and universities.

The outlook for near-term deployment of new nuclear generation is the best it has been since the 1970's. Public support and acceptance is strong. Nuclear power economics are looking very encouraging. The recent Energy legislation that is favorable for the new nuclear option is supported by both the Administration and Congress. And, DOE has two programs for new nuclear construction, NP2010 and GEN IV.

The NP2010 program for evolutionary light water plants is moving forward with the three Early Site Permits nearing completion of NRC reviews and the start of two Combined Operating Licensing applications for multiple designs. Two additional utilities have filed grant applications for ESPs. The licensing process is in the final stage of validation, so that a stable and reliable set of review methods will be available for utility decisions in the near term. The utility and NEI leadership has been exceptional in resolving key issues.

The GEN IV program for advanced plants is progressing with high focus on the Next Generation Nuclear Plant (NGNP), a high-temperature gas reactor design, to be built in Idaho. Under the leadership of Admiral **John Grossenbacher** and the Idaho National Lab (INL), this track is moving forward but requires more emphasis on utility requirements and commercialization options to provide a stronger tie to the industrial base for electricity and hydrogen.

CNC seeks feedback, suggestions, and volunteers to help. See the OPD website for announcement of the location and times for the CNC meeting at the June national meeting.

Nominating CommitteeBy Sophie Gutner

You must have received by now your OPD ballot for the upcoming election. The Nominating Committee had the difficult assignment of identifying and selecting the best candidates to fill the open positions on the OPD Executive Committee in June. Since these candidates, when elected, are going to work for all members of OPD, we take this process very seriously and urge you to send in your ballot in time. Our thanks go to the members that have agreed to be candidates.

Candidates for positions on the Executive Committee, if elected, will serve three-year terms, from June 2005 through June 2008. Members of the Executive Committee are asked to attend the two annual meetings (in June and November). Missing two meetings in a row may cause that member to be removed from the Executive Committee.

Officer-position candidates that are elected must go through a different process, which is somewhat specific to OPD. Once someone is elected as Treasurer, he/she will automatically move up, each year, through the positions of Secretary, Second Vice-Chair, First Vice-Chair, and Chair, in an unopposed election unless someone else is elected as a write-in candidate. This is a very long commitment. It is difficult for anyone to predict his/her circumstances (personal and professional) for the next 5-6 years. This is one of the reasons why it has become quite hard to find members who will agree to commit for such a long time, hence the fact that we only have one candidate for the position of Treasurer on this year's ballot. We appreciate our officers – past, present, and future – so much for their dedication!

OPD Focuses On Student Members

At the 2004 Winter meeting, the OPD Executive Committee identified the need for a Student Outreach Plan and budgeted \$3000 to support implementation of the plan in 2005.

The Student Member segment is an important and fast growing portion of total ANS membership. The 1230 Student Members constituted about 11.4% of the 10,777 ANS members in 2004. From 1999 through 2004, ANS News recorded the enrollment of 2520 Student Members from 140 different schools. Since 1999, Student Membership has increased (about 67%) while total membership has decreased slightly (about 3.5%). In 2004 as in other years, nearly 20% of Student Members chose OPD to make OPD the second most popular Division behind the Reactor Physics Division.

But the focus of the OPD Student Outreach Plan is the conversion of Student Members to Full Members. In a typical year, only 75 of the 225 graduating Student Members (who do not continue as graduate students) convert to Full Membership, and remaining 150 drop their ANS membership.
